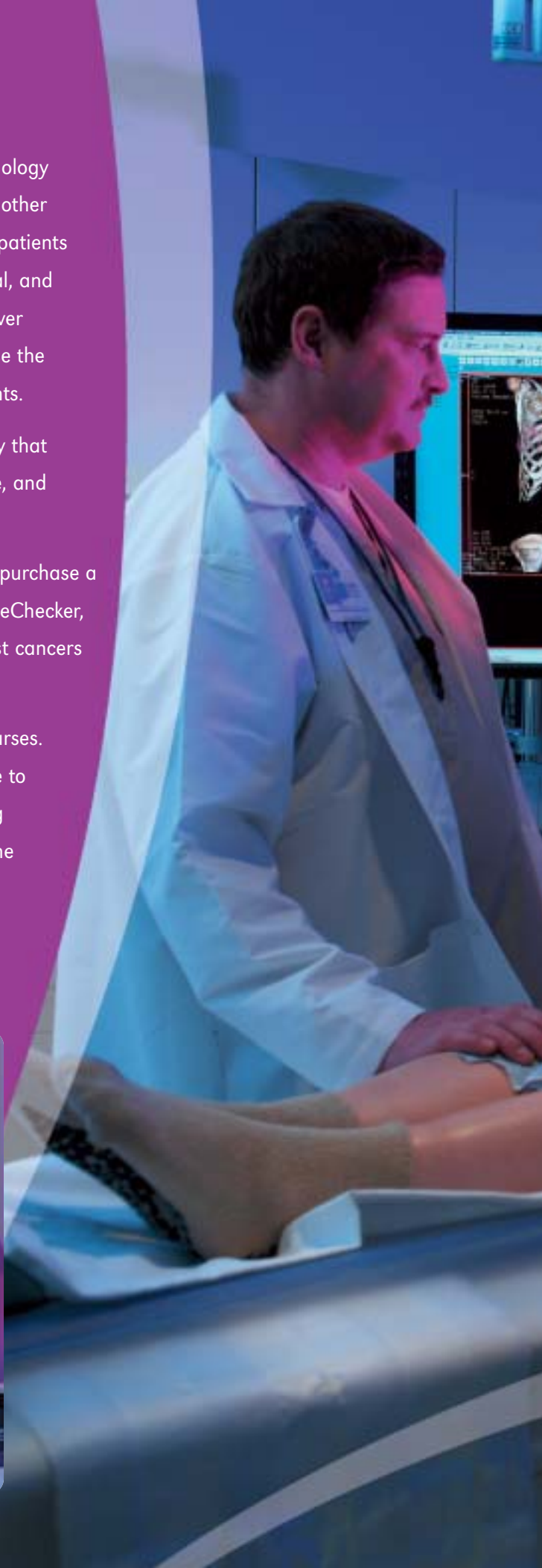
Today, with help from St. Luke's Center for Community Health, the Department of Health and Welfare, Bellevue Elementary School, and the Blaine County Hunger Coalition, this fragile family is beginning to heal.

More and more, we are turning to medical technology that complements the skills and expertise of physicians and other health care providers. Advances in technology are allowing patients to be diagnosed more quickly, spend less time in the hospital, and make a more rapid recovery. That is why St. Luke's Wood River Medical Center Foundation is committed to helping purchase the tools needed to provide the best possible care for our patients.

One step at a time, our goal is to make available technology that will help our local physicians accurately screen for, diagnose, and successfully treat a wide range of illnesses and injuries.

To this end, donations to the Foundation have been used to purchase a state-of-the-art MRI scanner, a CT scanner, and the R2 ImageChecker, which helps radiologists detect up to 23 percent more breast cancers than mammography alone.

The people at St. Luke's are much more than doctors and nurses. We're your friends and your neighbors, with the same desire to raise healthy families and enjoy life to the fullest. By working together, we hope to someday soon be able to provide for the health care needs of nearly every person in the Valley.









Shirley Renick knows the true meaning of giving. Over the past 15 years, she has volunteered her time and talents in so many ways, serving on the Auxiliary Board, on the Center for Community Health Advisory Board, and as President of the Foundation Board. She has organized conferences, coordinated luncheons and been an active fundraiser. Now, Shirley has moved into a new phase of volunteering, as a certified pet therapist.

The Pet Therapy program at St. Luke's Wood River Medical Center offers visits from very special canine friends and their handlers. For patients and staff alike, these compassionate pooches provide a welcome diversion from the hospital routine. While our nurses provide the TLC, Pet Therapy dogs provide solace from worry, with warm hearts and wagging tails.

Shirley and her border collie mix, Rowdy, who has, sadly, passed away, were among St. Luke's Wood River Medical Center's first class of Pet Therapy candidates. Now, Shirley is looking forward to enrolling one-year-old Latte, a gorgeous Labradoodle, into the program.

Volunteers such as Shirley truly make a difference for our patients and their families. Studies have shown that Pet Therapy visits help lower the patient's heart rate, lessen anxiety, reduce blood pressure, and serve as a distraction from pain.

As Shirley and Latte know, sometimes the best medicine comes in a furry package!





Imagine a world where teens and adults communicate openly — sharing dreams and ideas, hopes and fears, with a goal to make life better for everyone. Angenie McCleary, coordinator of Youth Adult Konnections (YAK), is making that world a reality.

YAK, a community collaboration that helps build developmental assets for Blaine County youth, is sponsored by St. Luke's Wood River Foundation; St. Luke's Wood River Medical Center; the Blaine County School District; the City of Ketchum; the Blaine County Recreation District; and Blaine County Probation Department. As lead sponsors, St. Luke's and the hospital Foundation provide for Angenie's position as well as major funding for YAK, allowing the program to reach hundreds of youth each year.

Angenie and four local students recently attended the National Young Women's Health Summit in Washington, DC. Upon their return home, Angenie challenged these four YAK members to implement one thing they learned at the summit. The students chose to tackle our community's increasing youth drug abuse problem.

These remarkable teens, in partnership with The Walker Center and the Blaine County Probation Department, arranged a panel discussion on drug and alcohol addiction that included a physician, a counselor, and two youths in recovery. More than 70 students participated.

YAK's commitment paid off where it counts most: by directly impacting, and possibly saving, the life of an at-risk youth. Following the panel discussion, many teens approached Angenie with concerns about friends' drug or alcohol use. One youth was deemed to be particularly at risk, and intervention occurred. As a result, the youth received treatment, and is no longer using drugs.

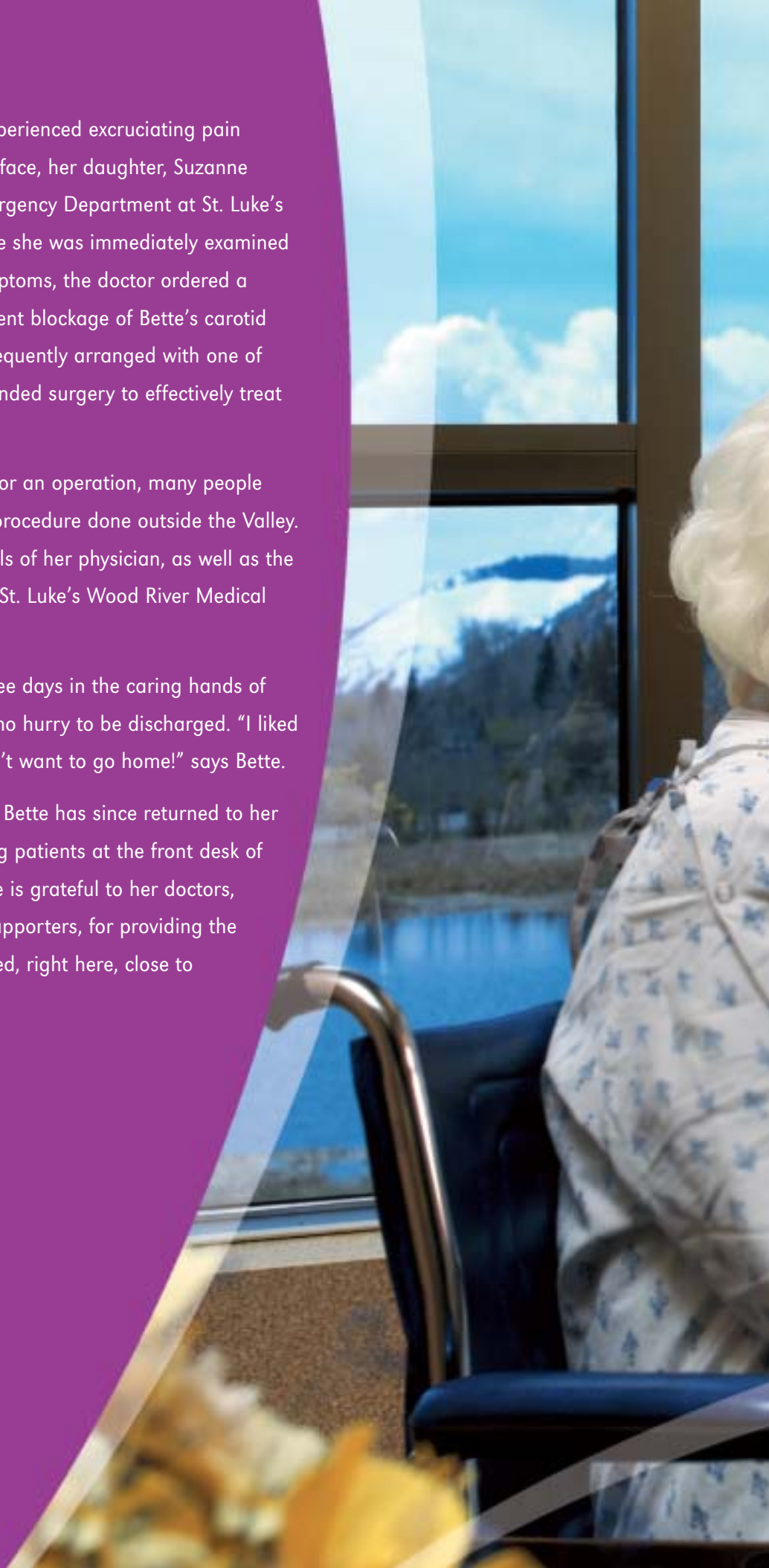
Drug and alcohol abuse happens around the clock. That's why Angenie and her 70 dedicated YAK members are making a difference in our community, every minute of every day.

When 85-year-old Bette Durkin experienced excruciating pain on the right side of her head and face, her daughter, Suzanne Cunningham, took her to the Emergency Department at St. Luke's Wood River Medical Center, where she was immediately examined by a doctor. Based on Bette's symptoms, the doctor ordered a CT scan, which showed a 75 percent blockage of Bette's carotid artery. An appointment was subsequently arranged with one of our local surgeons, who recommended surgery to effectively treat the problem.

When Bette mentioned her need for an operation, many people recommended that she have the procedure done outside the Valley. But Bette was confident in the skills of her physician, as well as the technology and quality of care at St. Luke's Wood River Medical Center. She opted to stay.

Following surgery, Bette spent three days in the caring hands of St. Luke's nurses, and she was in no hurry to be discharged. "I liked how I was treated so much, I didn't want to go home!" says Bette.

The operation was a success, and Bette has since returned to her job of 23 years, cheerfully greeting patients at the front desk of her son-in-law's dental clinic. Bette is grateful to her doctors, St. Luke's staff, and Foundation supporters, for providing the expertise and resources she needed, right here, close to home in the Wood River Valley.









As a not-for-profit hospital, St. Luke's Wood River Medical Center maintains an "open door" policy. This means we provide care to every person in need, regardless of their ability to pay. As such, last year charity care was provided to 191 patients who could not otherwise afford to pay.

In addition to caring for so many, the hospital received accreditation from the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations (JCAHO), a standard achieved by only a handful of community hospitals. Also last year, Avatar International, the leader in measuring customer expectations in health care, acknowledged the hospital's efforts with awards for Exceeding Patient Expectations and Overall Best Performer.
